CHESTER TIMES – February 12, 1917 – ROTARY CLUB IS ORGANIZED – Branch of the National Association of Business Men Formed in This City

For the purpose of organizing a branch of the National Rotary Club, a representative group of local business men, gathered at the historic Washington House, Saturday evening, and took the first initial step in having this city represented in that great organization of civic and business development. The meeting was held with the approbation of the International Association of Rotary Clubs, of which the local club, becomes a branch. Dr. Augustus Koenig, president of the Philadelphia Club and E. A. Knoblach, an officer of the same club, who were authorized by the parent body to superintendent the induction of the new organization in this city, gave interesting talks about the purpose of the organization and offered valuable information to the local men in making their initial plans.

Following the private dinner served on the sun porch, the speechmaking was started by the visitors in explaining Rotarian fellowship. At the present time Rotary Clubs are important factors in the civic and business development of over three hundred American cities. Especially in the western country Rotarians are doing notable work in keeping before the public the inducements their city offer.

The Philadelphians prophesied abundant success for the new organization, which is in fact but little younger than the already notable Wilmington Club. Under the chairmanship of William A. Brown, the group organized under the regulations of the National Association, and elected the following officers: Edwin D. Glauser, president; W. A. Brown, vice president; George W. Thomson, treasurer; E. Wallace Chadwick, secretary. The following were elected directors for the ensuing term: Albert R. Granger, Henry J. Klaer, Charles R. Along, R. V. Little and Robert H. McCurdy.

Arrangements were immediately made to commence the series of weekly club lunches and monthly dinners which are compulsory upon the members and which are the basis of Rotarian fellowship. At these meetings are realized the opportunities which the club affords for closer acquaintanceship and more helpful co-operation in advancing the business interests of the community.
